This question ultimately end with this work - my Master thesis. This work attempts to answer Katharine Haake's question from her chapter in *English Studies: An Introduction to the Discipline(s)*: "What, we might wonder, are we training these writers to do?" Haake's question was difficult to answer - much like my own at the time.
